The 32nd annual Soup and Sandwich Luncheon is fast approaching. Mark your calendars for Tues., Oct. 11th. (Don't forget the all important prep day on Monday, the 10th either.) We need all hands on deck for our No. 1 fundraiser. Our fundraising needs are crucial!! Our luau was cancelled and our Mexican dinner did not repeat this year. Our only collected funds came from "Affairs of the Heart" last February. We have been tapped from the "Great Flood of 2011" both in money and volunteerism. Our community is still reeling. Unemployment is high and inflation is rising. The poor are getting poorer from high food and gas prices. You can make a difference! The monies raised will help the less fortunate in our community in ways such as: client assistance; Angel Tree gifts; food pantry supplies; food for Mission 66 Diner; flood assistance. You are their helping hands and must reach out into the community to secure the funds to assist others, thus "Serving up Hope."

Now is the time to come to action -- volunteer, sell tickets, and collect auction items. Our goal this year is \$15,000. We have 800 tickets to sell at \$8/each. Last year we had \$5,600 in ticket sales, \$1,417 from the bake sale, and \$5,856 from the silent auction. We need to repeat this and DO MORE!

Let's get this year covered. Thanks for filling the gap!



My Disaster Center Experience (Thoughts from the Client Intake Office)

Salvation Army Disaster Emergency Center Great Flood of May 2011 Pearl W. Carter July 8, 2011

During the Great Flood of May 2011 it has been my privilege to serve as volunteer case manager for the Salvation Army at its disaster emergency operations center. We pulled together a team of six ladies to tackle the awesome task of taking applications and determining and filling the needs of the over 400 families who applied for assistance. Many applicants found it necessary to return several times resulting in +1000 total visits serving +2600 people overall. In addition, three churches were assisted with cleaning supplies, as well as Rainbow Farms and several businesses.

I am very grateful to our case management staff for their exceptionally dedicated and compassionate service. In addition, quite a number of volunteers assisted with Xeroxing, served as runners back and forth to the warehouse and various other tasks. Once the paperwork was completed, the vouchers were passed to our awesome warehouse volunteers to fill the orders and load the goods into the client's vehicle.

It's not easy to hear the heartbreaking stories while trying to keep your composure and assure the client that things "will be alright". The case management staff posted the following quote along with a prayer by Phillip Huber: "In our sadness can be seeds that God will cultivate to grow a rainbow of joy." "Dear God of all comfort, help us to rest in the hope that you will bring joy out of our sorrow. Amen"

There are over 400 different stories we could tell. But I'd like to share just a few of those joys and sorrows with you.

One morning during our first week at the Disaster Center, a gentleman with no legs rolled into our warehouse in his wheelchair and offered his services as a volunteer. He stated that he was very strong in his upper body and could pack boxes and do most things anyone else could do.

While taking her application, a lady from Port Gibson became emotional while telling me that her little dog had been eaten by an alligator.

A lady representing a small United Methodist Church in Olive Branch, MS called offering their services as an experienced rebuilding team. They would bring all tools necessary to help anyone tear out and rebuild their homes. The very next day an 89-year-old lady came in seeking help. Her home had been condemned by the city and she either had to have the house torn down or the city would do it and charge her \$6,000. She had no

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means to pay either the city of someone else to tear it down. Contact was made and when she was told that the Church group would arrive in late July to do the work for her free of charge, she burst into tears (as did we).

A youth pastor, his wife and a team of about 12 young people came from Pineville, LA to spend several days cleaning out a home. The homeowner's wife has respiratory problems and their son is being treated for cancer.

Although our stated hours were 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., many days our ladies stayed late to process applications for individuals who could not come in until they got off work or for other reasons. One such gentleman had been living in his car in the Kings Community. He traveled to work in a pick-up truck his Church had helped him acquire. When the roads were closed he could not get back to move the car and he lost everything from the flooding.

A young single mother of one did not have flooding but a large tree had fallen right beside her trailer home and onto the air conditioner. She had no one to cut and remove the tree. Victor Hoofman, owner of Bosk-N-Bower Tree Services was contacted and graciously agreed to contribute his services free of charge (with a little sweet talk from Aunt Pearl). Ironically, the lady's name is the same as Vic's mother's maiden name.

Trouble seems to come in batches. This was the case with one client in particular. Her husband had surgery at an out-of-town location. He got a serious infection and is still hospitalized in intensive care. Meantime, she had to have knee surgery. When the notice came out about the flooding, she had their trailer home moved out of the flood zone thinking that she would be reimbursed by FEMA. However, because the home was moved and did not take on floodwater, FEMA did not qualify her for assistance. She was badly in need of help to have a waterline run and facilities hooked up at the new location. Once again, God sent help in the form of First Presbyterian Church and Danny Jones who stepped in to solve her problem

A mother of three revealed that when they had to vacate their home they had nowhere to go so they lived in their car (5 people). When they were able to go back home their dog alerted them to a large snake in the children's bedroom. The children were terrified of being in the house so the family stayed in the car several more nights. Now the children are scared and refuse to sleep in the bedroom or by themselves.

As with any major effort of this type, there were a few disappointments and a few who took advantage or misused the system. This was the case with only a minute percentage of our clients. I cannot describe for you how rewarding my participation in this event has been. Just knowing that so many people have been helped by our Salvation Army and its outstanding volunteers is joy beyond description.

Update July 19, 2011:

Sadly, two of our families suffered additional tragedy last week. The gentlemen who got the infection in the hospital passed away on Wednesday. The little 8-year old boy who drowned was a member of a client family. Letters of condolence are being sent to both families and Captain Bhatnagar plans to visit each family.

The young man who lived in his car and lost everything had given me his clothing sizes. The afternoon of his interview my sister happened to drop some of her husband's clothes off for me to take to the Thrift Store. You guessed it! They were the exact sizes he needed. I called him next day and he was extremely grateful.
